The Backbone of This Organization

IN LAST MONTH'S column, I wrote about the first "I" in "IIBEC"—IIBEC's international presence. This month, I want to shift perspectives because, of course, IIBEC is not just an international institute; we are also an organization that depends on the service of our local chapters.

A few weeks ago, we held the 2024 IIBEC Leadership Development Workshop at our headquarters in Raleigh, North Carolina. This annual event is an opportunity for IIBEC board members, sponsors, and local chapter leaders to gather, exchange ideas, and nurture our leadership skills. It was an honor for me to participate this year, and I was particularly inspired by the many great ideas that the chapter representatives in attendance shared. As I said in my opening remarks at the workshop, "Chapters are the backbone of this organization. IIBEC is successful, in part, due to your efforts at the local level."

These efforts by local chapters are wide ranging and offer something for every IIBEC member. When you join a local chapter, you will find continuing education opportunities, including topics of particular relevance in your local market. You can also enjoy social events, help support charities and the RCI-IIBEC Foundation, and participate in your local chapter's critical advocacy work at the municipal, state, and provincial levels of government. Additionally, as the Chicago Area Chapter notes on its web page, an objective for IIBEC chapters is "engendering positive working relations with local trade organizations, construction material manufacturers, and local product representatives."
