Why Service Is Its Own Reward

If you are not already volunteering, I hope that their excellent examples will inspire you to get involved and provide service to our association. Start with a small step if that's what feels right for you. If we each take a single step, that's forward momentum for us all.

If you're still on the fence about becoming a volunteer, maybe I can convince you by noting that participation in IIBEC service is its own kind of member benefit. This may sound like a sales pitch, but I'm simply discussing what I've learned during my 20-plus years with RCI and IIBEC.

Based on my personal experience, I can confidently say that service within IIBEC will enrich your personal practice in several ways. First, participation in IIBEC activities will give you insight into where you stand technically and professionally—by interacting with other members, you will be able to identify your particular strengths, areas where others are stronger than you, what you need to learn, and where you need to grow to round out your practice and better serve your clients. Second, through the process of volunteering, you'll get

to know colleagues and contacts within your community. As you build this network, you'll have opportunities to leverage new, relevant resources and to enter into mutually beneficial strategic partnerships. Third, and best of all, you will form lasting friendships with kindred spirits you find along the way.

Here are a few ways you can pitch in, serve, and make our IIBEC community stronger:

- Volunteer to speak at a chapter event about a topic where you have expertise, or help the chapter book another subject matter expert for a chapter presentation.
- Help your local chapter manage its finances and administration. If you are a small business owner, you can share what you know about issues such as registering a business annually with the secretary of state or other government entities, or tax preparation.
- Be a student host/mentor at the 2025 Building Enclosure Symposium in St. Louis, Missouri, or at the 2026 IIBEC International Convention and Trade Show in Sacramento, California.
- Join Project Excel as a mentor or a mentee (https://iibec.org/project-excel).
- Become an officer on your chapter board, or let your local leadership know that you're available to help in a particular area.
- Collaborate with peers as a member of one of IIBEC's committees or task forces.
